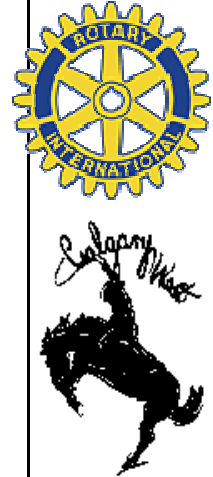

WOW, it has been a full year on the board overseeing the club management portfolio. I am grateful to all those who lead teams and committees under this portfolio who made my job so easy. Personally, I would like to thank the following for their help and assistance over the last 12 months in their areas of concentration.

Thanks to David Williams and all he has done to keep up our weekly bulletins and launch and fine tune this excellent monthly newsletter! To John Rymes and Sa'adat Keshavjee and their roles with the RI Foundation. To Robyn Braley for all his hard work on the communications and marketing side, getting our club profile and name out there! To Ray Falk and Pauline Evans for their work in making the club members more aware of each other and our stories. To Essya and Fabio for their exchange student articles for the bulletin. To Doug Chisholm and the committee and board members who constantly submitted articles for this great newsletter. Of course to Ron Brookes for his work in "greening" our club and Rick Dreja for his work in ensuring a volunteer corps of people when needed throughout the year. And thanks to Karl for his work on keeping our Club Runner web site updated with bulletins and information as it has been presented to us. We had two fantastic assemblies this year at great locations thanks to Margot and her committees. And, of course, to our President-elect Garfield, thank you for your work and due diligence on the continuity plan for succession and future of our club. Thank you to all of you and your committees for making my job so easy this year.

As a recap of the year, here is my report submitted to the board that outlines each area of concentration in this portfolio, its accomplishments and those goals we did not succeed at.

Foundations

A very good year lead by Sa'adat. We had al-

most a record activity by club members with sustaining PHF and cash contributions. The club matched each club member PHF contribution to a total of \$200 US per sustaining membership. There was good information presented to the club through announcements at meetings and also articles in the monthly newsletter on the Foundation and what it does.

In regards to the Calgary Rotary Clubs Foundation, the board for the first time passed a motion to also match these dollars up to \$200 per person. This committee was not as active and the promotion as such did not work as well. Very few such matching contributions were engaged.

The club had a total of \$6000 US to match for RI Foundation. This was paid \$4000 in cash and 2000 in points leaving a balance of points (after awarding several PHF through the club) of 12,000 for 2007-08 year.

Communications

This was a large portfolio. Unfortunately a partner to assist us with the web site did not come to fruition this year. We tried to keep the existing Club Runner web site updated, but unfortunately were not able to make the planned big step of moving it to the next level.

We did, however, expand our Strawberry Shortcakes web site to offer more information on the club and club activities. This was an added bonus.

The roster was again handled by Gordon Rodrigues who keeps it updated based on being provided information.

We were able to receive great media attention through Strawberry Shortcakes thanks to Robyn Braley. Several articles, plus a RI grant



for radio advertising ensured success of the fundraiser, plus garnered profile and branding for our club. Several award (RI) applications were also submitted with announcements yet to be made on winners at time of writing.

The weekly newsletter continued in the same format with some reporters throughout the year failing to make good on duties and thus a few late editions.

We did move this year to a more "showcase" monthly bulletin by David Williams. David did a fantastic job on this. It was much more appealing both to look at as well as read. It included RI articles, the president's message and board reports and committee messages as well as pictures, exchange student stories and such. Very well done to David. Also, thanks to Doug Chisholm for his articles which were well written and thought provoking. The biggest disappointment in this monthly newsletter regard was the lack of articles submitted monthly by board members and their committees. There is a great deal of information to disseminate and this is the ideal medium, but, for the most part, few used it.

If a partner to assist in this could be found, the idea scenario would be to publish this level of newsletter on a weekly basis through Club Runner.

Environment

Ron Brookes did a good job heightening the awareness of a "greener club" through newsletter articles as well as working with the program committee to deliver "environmental" speakers to the club. He also initiated a "battery" drop-off centre at the club for used alkaline batteries which fill and contaminate our landfills presently.

Volunteer Coordinator

Though our plan to initiate a full study to determine members' preferences in regards to volunteering (need for leadership versus just "worker bee") did not come to fruition, Rick

did work to ensure we had the necessary numbers for each of our events. Rick also had us join Volunteer Calgary for future recruitment needs for volunteers.

Assemblies

Margo did a great job with both assemblies. Both were held off-site in unique venues with entertainment as well as tours and the traditional business component. These were very well received.

Vocational Awareness

This year, two new vocational elements were added to enlighten club members about each other. One was monthly articles in the newsletter about club members, their history, their background and their role in Rotary. The second was the occasional "roving reporter" at club meetings with humorous and fun "interviews" with club members about unique stories in their lives. Both were well received and should be continued if possible.

Continuity

A full continuity plan for the club was developed to set forth planning for long term stability in projects for fundraising and gifting. This was conducted, made available to the club for comments and then included in the revised by-laws of the club. This is a major step forward for the future and keeps us in line with RI planning.

I look forward to any feedback and wish all the best to Garth Evans and his team who will undertake all this for the 2007-08 Rotary year, while I take on the Community Services and International Gifting portfolios.

Summary of the Board Meeting of May 14, 2007

The meeting was also attended by new board members: Lynne Thornton, Garth Evans, Mike Reikie and Marie Rickard.

Business

- The date for our 4th quarter casino has not yet been established.
- The review of our club accounts should be completed by the end of May.
- Murray Hunter is following up on the club's RI contributions on behalf of Clarence and Evelyn Buckley in recognition of their 50th wedding anniversary.
- Robyn Braley is sending RI the relevant information and forms needed for the \$2000.00 Strawberry Shortcake promotion.

President's Report

- The All Calgary Presidents committee has not received the final report of the Integrity Awards All Calgary committee. Therefore, the all presidents committee will not make any recommendations until the receipt of the report.
- Continuity (long term plan) Plan is done. The new board members will receive copies of all board meeting minutes and director reports in order to meet the objectives of the Continuity Plan. It is also recommended that club members work on a variety of committees so that a strong foundation of expertise is established throughout the club and that the continuity of club business becomes more seamless.
- The board will begin the process of applying for a raffle licence; this is to ensure that the club is adhering to regulations governing 50/50 draws.
- The board discussed the possibility of supporting the personal interests of members with regard to charities they want to promote by matching up to a maximum of \$500.00 per member providing that such a request is approved by the Gifting Committee. A budget amount of \$2500.00 for this initiative is being considered.
- President Mike French told board members that the relationship with the Danish Canadian club continues to be cordial and that the management of the Danish Canadian club has made it clear that they would like to be of service in the future for any offsite meetings we plan. To recognise service received from the staff of the Danish Canadian Club, the board passed the motion by Brent Barootes/Stan Cichon to give the staff a gratuity of \$300.00.

Treasurer's Report

- Murray Hunter presented the financial statements and responded to questions.
- Murray reiterated that member dues pay for the operation of the club and that only the general account can be used to cover club expenses. At this time, only assemblies, District and International conferences are subsidised. Member dues can be reviewed by the incoming board and they can set their new budget.
- The motion by Stan Cichon/Garfield Ganong to accept the Treasurer's Report passed.

The secretary had no report.

Club Management Report

- Assembly tickets are \$25.00 to members; the real cost is \$30.00 and the club will subsidise the additional cost of \$5.00.
- In preparation for the assembly, board members are to prepare reports that will be circulated electronically to the membership and board members will be prepared to answer any questions by members at the assembly. The incoming board members will give a brief two minute overview of their portfolio.

Membership Report

- Our newest member, Kurt Schurer, will be inducted at the June 1st regular meeting.
- The motion by Bill Lawless/Marg Henschel to approve Adam Joyce as a candidate for membership was passed. Adam will be invited to join the club upon approval by the membership. Adam's classification is commercial insurance.
- There was a discussion about ways to speed up the process of having new members inducted into the club.
- The Fireside has been cancelled. It is important to have information sessions for new members and ideas on better ways of achieving this goal were discussed. In the meantime, it is incumbent upon sponsors to educate new members about Rotary.
- The motion by Stan Cichon/Marg Henschel to excuse Jo Johanson from attending regular meetings because Jo fulfills the age requirements passed.
- Mike French and Garfield Ganong reviewed the attendance reports and everything is satisfactory. The incoming board members will receive the attendance report.

Gifting Committee

- Community donations await transfer from the casino account.
- Budget for both Community and International donations are \$40000.00
- A list of pending donations will be given to the new board members.

Funding Committee

- The price of Stampede Breakfast tickets has been reviewed and a net increase of approximately \$400.00 over last year is expected.
- Chris Davis is arranging for the necessary permits.
- There are no plans at this time to approach other companies about purchasing breakfast tickets only from the club.
- Calgary Co-op is interested in continuing the Strawberry Shortcake partnership. We are attempting to negotiate a 5 year term. We are also approaching Tiger Tell re: credit card purchases.

Club Activities

- Marg Henschel is very pleased with the accomplishments by the various committees this year.
- Due to a Fall-like barbeque during Stampede Week with the visiting Rotarians from

- Orangeville, the Activities committee has replaced the Fall Barbeque with a Lobster Feast (more details to follow).
- There was a discussion about the change of venue to the Elbow River Casino. The matter of excluding club membership input into any decision regarding the change of venue was a concern for some members. President Mike French emphasised his willingness to discuss the decision to move and the reasons for the move with any member. The subject of a change has been raised in every member survey.

Youth Committee

- Ryla Weekend (May 11-13) went well.
- Since David D. Oughton School has closed, we are continuing the relationship with Radisson School. Their opening is scheduled for June 1, 2007 and representatives from the club will attend. The board passed a motion at the March meeting to provide some funding for the celebration.
- Members involved with our youth programs must have police clearance. Brenda is trying to arrange a time for having the necessary papers signed at one of regular meetings.
- A motion by Brenda Sali/George Edwards to provide up to a maximum of \$500.00 to Meredith Johnson so that she can attend a Leadership Conference passed. Meredith requires \$3000.00 and this donation is conditional upon Meredith having the other \$2500.00 first. The motion passed with one opposed.
- The issue of our partnership with Lord Shaughnessy was once again discussed. The board first had to rescind a board decision to end the partnership. This was done and the matter was discussed and the motion by Marg Henschel/Brent Barootes to end the partnership with Lord Shaughnessy and Centre West Campus passed.

The next meeting is scheduled for June 28, 2007

Comments from President Elect Garfield Ganong

This past year has been a significant year of change. Mike's board is to be commended for a great job of rejuvenating Calgary West through change. Calgary West "Where Rotary Works" couldn't have been stated better and was an excellent motto for Mike and his board this year. Having been on the board this past year as president-elect and being a part of the work that has been done has set the stage for 2007-08 and beyond. An important component of that stage setting and focus has been continuity and long term planning. Continuity in governance has been achieved by electing 50% of the board each year, and continuity in operations is being achieved by creating vice-chairs or co-chairs of committees that can move into the chairmanship the following year, and by getting the buy in of the direction of the club by working with the immediate past president, president, president-elect and president-nominee and through a shared vision of multi-year commitments whether it be community, such as Feed the Hungry, Habitat for Humanity, or International, such as stoves, houses for Mexico, water filters, micro-credit, etc. By having this continuity and planning in place, each new board does not have to start from scratch each July. I was recently at the opening session of the RYLA held at the U of C and organized by our own Dan Doherty and Brenda Sali. Every member should have exposure to our youth and the many programs Calgary

West supports. To listen to the excitement and passion of the young people in the U of C and U of Lethbridge Rotaract clubs and to see what they have done in local and international service is enough to re-awaken the passion in the most cynical of us. I know that it affected me.

I want this year to be one of fellowship with a purpose! Fun! Exciting! And meaningful to each of you. I want your chest and heart to swell with pride and humility! I want your emotions to explode as you become part of and understand that you are making someone else's life locally and internationally just a little bit better! As a mentor of mine once said, Don't throw your hands up in despair at the enormity of the poverty, sickness and death throughout the world, revel in the joy brought to one child's face at a time as a result of the community and international projects such as stoves, water filters, schools brings to him or her and their families. It is when we get down to one-on-one through perhaps a hands-on project where we can see and feel the difference we are making that we really start to get it.

We hope that, with input from our membership, we can expand this program next year.

As in-coming president, Garfield would like to see continuity in the projects and changes that the board has implemented this year. He would also like to see an increase in the opportunities for fellowship and service.

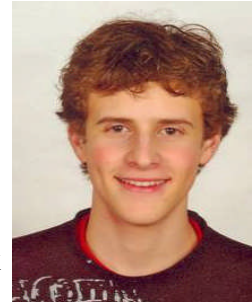

I enjoy life here due to many reasons. I assume mainly due to new experiences as well as good friends. Furthermore I also really like my current host family and I strongly dislike the fact that I will have to move on shortly. In school I have also made a couple of new friends. A few of the experiences I made this month were that I could accompany my host family to Vancouver for spring break. We therefore left on Thursday at 2pm. I enjoyed my last couple of days in Calgary before we departed for Vancouver. We drove to Kamloops which is a city in the Okanagan in the middle of BC. We arrived there at approximately 7pm and according to my host parents it was a very easy ride that day. We had a reserved hotel in Kamloops. In the evening we dined in a Milestone's which one of the many steakhouses in the western Canada. The next morning we took off quite early. It took us another 4 hours to finally reach the Vancouver area. Fortunately I was able to nap during that time. First we stopped at the Stanley Park after crossing the Lion's Gate Bridge. The devastation was heart-breaking to see that so much forest was broken down by one storm. Thereafter we drove down to Granville Island which I recalled having been on six years ago. It is a very special place with an open market and extraordinary stores. Later on we drove through the down-

town area of Vancouver and subsequently to the UBC campus which is supposedly one of the most gorgeous in the world. After wandering through downtown at night we took a ferry to Bowen Island the next morning. My host family have a few friends there. Hence, we stayed at their newly built place for a couple of nights. I made some new experiences, for instance we could go for a boat ride. Subsequently, we drove for 11 hours back to Calgary the day after during which I napped and finished homework. This trip was certainly my highlight of the year.



After that I participated in various events. For instance I went to a play with my last host family. On the same day in the evening I went to Martin's (Dutch exchange student) new host family because they invited me over for dinner. Having said all this my exchange year is absolutely enjoyable and whether it is my host families, the Rotary club, school, friends or even work for school regardless of the fact that I may be doing more work for school than the average exchange student. Therefore isn't it an asset to be different for instance that completing homework has strongly improved my English abilities, isn't school part of the culture, etc?

We started back in November with our Szalgavato, which is a declaration that you are going to be graduating and a chance to show off your dance skills. Thursday we start with serenading your teachers until 11 pm at night, visiting each one at their home. Friday is spent parading through your school dressed up in ridiculous costumes, singing, giving out candy and cheek kisses in bright lipstick to every class in school. The graduation ceremony's on Saturday, one at school and one in the town square. I enjoyed every minute of it.

With the school year winding down, we are having to say goodbyes. My fellow exchange students have become my family, and to say goodbye to them not knowing when we will see each other again is awful. When I think about all the amazing elements of the Rotary exchange program the friends you gain from all over the world is by far the best. I have matured, expanded my horizons, learned a different language, experienced a different culture, but I have also gained life long friends from all over the world, Brazil, Mexico, Japan, Australia, Hungary, and the US. I hope in all of my updates it has come through just how happy I am, and what an amazing year I have had. And I have to thank you, the Rotary Club of Calgary West, for making this possible.
